Stillbirth/S.A.D.S. (Sudden Antenatal Death Syndrome	The death of a baby in its mother's womb due to natural causes after 20 weeks of gestational age, and up to the moment of delivery. Prematurity	A baby that is born before 37 weeks of gestation, counting from the first day of the Last Menstrual Period.
